## Quilting

Although quilting can be traced to prehistoric times, it flourished in Europe from the 17th through the 19th century. Quilting was brought over to America with the colonists, who often used the technique for such practical purposes as clothing and bedcovers. At first the designs imitated those of the English and Dutch, but soon an American style quilt took form.
Using such techniques as patchwork and applique, quilts commonly display geometric patterns or pictures of animals, people, and objects in nature. Often quilts are used to remember historical events, important family memories, or stories. They have truly become a symbolic
 representation of America's heritage.

More traditional quilts are fashioned by piecing together quilt blocks. In the illustration of the Storm at Sea quilt block below, you can see how the repetition of the pattern creates the finished product at the right.
